Rambles, Field Trips, and other outings

The KFN executive has reviewed the KFLA Public Health guidelines and have decided to tentatively book rambles and field trips under the following conditions:

- The maximum number of participants in a field trip or ramble will be based on the destination and focus of the trip and will be set by the trip leader. Please see details in the trip description.
- Participants must register with the leader by email or phone prior to the trip in order to receive details of the specific meeting point. *Please contact the trip leader by the means (email or phone) specified in the trip description.* Pre-registration will also facilitate contact tracing.
- Carpooling will not be arranged by the trip leader, as the KFN cannot encourage it at this time. Please arrange your own transportation.
- Please bring a mask to wear when in proximity to other participants. Please bring hand sanitizer for yourself.
- Please observe a 2m physical distance from others at all times.
- Equipment sharing (scopes, binoculars, lenses) is not encouraged by the KFN.
- Participants must declare:
 - ✓ that they have not experienced any flu-like symptoms,
 - ✓ that they have not tested positive for COVID-19 or been in contact with a person who has tested positive, and
 - ✓ that they have not been outside of the country in the past 14 days.
- Please consider the health and safety of others (and yourself!) If you are sick, please stay home.
- Be aware that these activities may be cancelled on short notice if there is a spike in COVID-19 infections in the Kingston area. Check the KFN website for updates.

As always, please come prepared for ticks (long sleeves, pants tucked in to socks).

Thursday 15 October Michael Runtz will present Algonquin Wild virtually

Michael Runtz was scheduled to be our Annual Dinner meeting speaker. Our dining has been cancelled, but Michael has generously agreed to give his talk via Zoom. Details of how you can join this virtual meeting will be sent in our next (November) newsletter.

Michael's association with Algonquin spans sixty years and includes working in the Park as an interpretive naturalist for 14 seasons. Michael hosted the international television series Wild by Nature, authored and illustrated 13 natural history books including Algonquin Wild, and an award-winning children's book on beavers for which he provided the images. In addition, Michael has written more than 1,100 natural history articles for newspapers and magazines (Nature's

Way is nearing its 30th season). Michael currently teaches Natural History and Ornithology courses at Carleton University where more than 50,000 students have taken his courses. His numerous awards include the Council of Canadian University Biology Chairs Distinguished Public Science Education Award and several Carleton University Teaching Achievement Awards. A popular keynote speaker and media guest, Michael was the only Canadian featured in the TVO/NHK Japan's Superteachers series.

Flora? Fauna? Fungus?

Two weeks ago I found something in the water, attached to a stick, in a lake close to Helen Quilliam Sanctuary. The lower, big mass shown in the photo on page 1 is about 10 inches in diameter. The whole thing is slimy and gelatinous.

What is it?? iNaturalist answered the question for me! It is Fauna, a Magnificent Bryozoan (*Pectinatella magnifica*), a "moss animal" belonging to the class Phylactolaemata. It is a colony of invertebrates, made up of millions of zooids, and is native to Eastern North America. Thanks iNaturalist!

Exploring Nature Online using iNaturalist



If you have a computer or smartphone and an email address, **iNaturalist** is a great way to document, identify and explore observations made in nature. You can post your own observations as well as view those submitted by others. You do not need a species identification to submit a photo or audio file, as the site assists with this via auto-identification software and identifications made by others (including some experts) who use the site.

Getting started is easy to do:

- Visit <https://www.inaturalist.ca/> and sign up for a free account; you will need an email address and a password.
- There are good instructions and tutorials online at <https://inaturalist.ca/pages/getting-started-inaturalist-canada>.
- Start adding observations through your personal account using the green upload button found near your profile icon at the top of each page.
- When viewing observations, you can use the filters to set parameters such as date, range, taxonomic group and more.

“Projects” in iNaturalist are a way of pooling observations made in specific locations and/or of particular species in an area. Projects can be found by searching under the Community tab. To post and explore observations made in the KFN study area, look for the **Natural History of the Kingston Study Area** project (<https://www.inaturalist.ca/projects/natural-history-of-the-kingston-study-area>) and join using the small “join this project” link found at the top right of the page. Observations you make within the KFN study area will be automatically added to the project.

Some other local projects that might interest you include: Moths of the Kingston study area, KFN Helen Quilliam Sanctuary, Frontenac Arch Natural Area, Thousand Islands National Park, Belle Island Species Count, Nature Conservancy of Canada - Ontario Region (which includes the Camden East Alvar, Milburn Creek, Elbow Lake and Freeman projects).
