### Thursday 21 January 2021 our speaker will be Dr. Anne Gunn, one of Canada's top caribou scientists

Dr. Gunn lived, worked and conducted research on caribou and muskox in the NWT and Nunavut for over 30 years. She is still actively involved in caribou management efforts, working with both government and Indigenous organizations. Her talk will focus on climate and the circumpolar decline in caribou populations.

Dr. Gunn was educated in UK prior to immigrating to Canada. She worked as a field biologist with the Government of the NWT (1979-2006), with time as the regional biologist in the central Arctic (Cambridge Bay and Kugluktuk, 1984-1993) and then the Caribou Biologist based in Yellowknife. Her knowledge and experience are from working and travelling on the land with people and from watching and counting caribou and muskoxen from the ground and the air.

Since leaving the government in 2006, Anne has continued to contribute on caribou for aboriginal co-management boards and councils including the Wek'èezhii Renewable Resource Board and Kivalliq Inuit Association. At the international scale, Anne helps run the Circum-Arctic Rangifer Monitoring and Assessment (CARMA) Network which is the international voice for wild reindeer and caribou and is recognized by the Arctic Council. As well, Anne contributes to the International Union for the Conservation of Nature's Deer Specialist Group and the Sheep/Goat Specialist Group (for muskoxen). As a member of the Global Initiative for Ungulate Migration, Anne is now working with many experts to create a global atlas for migrations.

## FIELD TRIPS

### **Conduct a CBC Survey workshops**

**Presenter/Leader: Carolyn Bonta** (bonta.johnson at sympatico.ca or 613-531-4578)

Interested in learning how to conduct a Christmas Bird Count survey? Our local CBC's are always seeking Citizen Scientists to help tally winter birds. Basic bird ID skills paired with enthusiasm is all you really need, yet the logistics and data-collection aspects of surveying can appear daunting the first time. This two-part training session is suitable for anyone who has never led a CBC survey (or even participated on a CBC!) and will cover the basics of surveying for both feeder-watching and outdoor census. While each of the virtual and outdoor sessions can suffice on its own, some aspects of surveying are better demonstrated online while others are best practiced in the field.

**Friday 11 December 7 to 8 pm Zoom: Part 1 – virtual workshop** Training will run 30-45 minutes followed by time for Q&A.

**Saturday 12 December 10am to 12noon Tree Frog Woods: Part 2 – mock survey** This outing will run approximately 2 hours over ~3km of gentle trails. There are benches and a pit privy on site. Bad weather date will be Sunday 13 December. Experienced birders and CBC surveyors are encouraged to attend and help mentor the new cohort!

### **Sunday 17 January 8am to 10am Car-Birding Portsmouth Harbour to Lemoine Point**

**Leader: Jenny Newton** (jennyn1434 at gmail.com) The distance may hardly be 12 km, but this stretch of waterfront boasts many excellent vantage points over a diversity of habitats. New to Kingston and new to birding, Jenny shares her favourite local route. Join her on a tour of where to go, where to park, and what to look for throughout the seasons. This month, keep an eye out for resident red-tailed hawks and bald eagles, winter waterfowl such as long-tailed ducks and red-breasted mergansers, and possible passerines such as snow buntings and northern shrikes. The emphasis of this trip will be on birding locations – an ideal orientation for new or out-of-town KFN members. Members with mobility issues are especially encouraged to participate on this outing, as our tour and birding will take place entirely from our vehicles. Walkie-talkies will be provided to allow communication between participants. Please email the trip leader to register; those without email can call the KFN Field Trips Coordinator at 613-531-4578. The number of vehicles will be limited for safety, so register early! Meeting location will be disclosed upon trip registration. It is anticipated this trip will take approximately 1.5-2 hours.

## **FALL ROUND-UP 2020: WE NEED YOUR HELP WITH PICTURES**

The Fall Round-up took place between Friday Nov 6 and Sunday Nov 8.

Pictures taken on those days of unusual birds were used to illustrate the article which will appear in the Blue Bill December issue. We did not have pictures for several other notable birds seen on that weekend so we are still looking for some pictures that will appear in a follow-up article.

The species we are looking for are: Cackling Geese, Canvasback, White-winged Scoter, Common Nighthawk, Black-bellied Plover, Pectoral Sandpiper, American Woodcock, Lesser Black-backed Gull, Eastern Screech Owl, Horned Lark, Evening Grosbeak, Common Redpoll, Hoary Redpoll, Red Crossbill, White-winged Crossbill and Pine Siskin.

The pictures must have been taken in 2020 in the Kingston region but otherwise there are no restrictions. Please send one, two or sixteen pictures to Gaye Beckwith (beckwithb at sympatico.ca). The selected pictures will appear with full credit in the March Blue Bill.

## **Field Trips and Rambles in the times of COVID**

- The maximum number of participants in a field trip or ramble will be based on the destination and focus of the trip and will be set by the trip leader.
- Participants must register with the leader by email or phone prior to the trip in order to receive details of the specific meeting point. *Please contact the trip leader by the means (email or phone) specified in the trip description.* Pre-registration will also facilitate contact tracing.
- Please bring a mask and hand sanitizer for yourself.
- Please observe a 2m physical distance from others at all times.
- Equipment sharing (scopes, binoculars, lenses) is not encouraged by the KFN.
- Participants must declare: ✓ that they have not experienced any flu-like symptoms, ✓ that they have not tested positive for COVID-19 or been in contact with a person who has tested positive, and ✓ that they have not been outside of the country in the past 14 days.
- Be aware that these activities may be cancelled on short notice if there is a spike in COVID-19 infections in the Kingston area. Check the KFN website for updates.

Did you know? **The Land Conservancy for Kingston, Frontenac, Lennox and Addington** (LC-KFLA) grew out of the Kingston Field Naturalists.

An Ad Hoc committee of ten members of the KFN executive was formed in 1999 to look at maintenance of the club's two properties, and the acquisition of several other properties. Ultimately, the KFN decided that land protection was not a priority for the club. KFN members Anne Robertson and Arthur (Bud) Rowe approached Vicki Schmolka for help setting up a local land trust. Founding members included Mike Evans, Paul Mackenzie, Larry McCurdy, and several other KFN members. The LC-KFLA's goal is to protect natural lands of significance in the region.

The LC-KFLA is a registered charity. It currently owns nine properties and holds conservation easements on two properties, preserving 310 hectares of ecologically-significant land for nature and providing habitat for eighteen species at risk.
