The March general meeting will feature a presentation by David Bree. The Zoom link will open at 7 pm; the formal meeting will start at 7:30 pm. From 7 to 7:30 we will feature a slide show of members submissions. To contribute, please send you photos or short video to info@kingstonfieldnaturalists.org. While the slide show is running on the main screen there will be a breakout room entitled "iNaturalist Q and A" hosted by our local iNaturalist guru, Mark Read. To enter the breakout room you will need to be running an up-to-date Zoom app on your mobile device or using the downloaded Zoom client on your regular computer. You may enter and exit the breakout room as often as you wish. The room will close after 25 minutes. Those familiar with iNaturalist as well as those wishing to get started are encouraged to join Mark to learn more about this amazing educational and scientifically valuable citizen science project.

Thursday 18 March David Bree will present: Bringing Moths into the Light

Moths are widespread but often under-appreciated creatures. Join David on this zoom exploration of the moth; what makes a moth a moth, the diversity of moths found in the Kingston area, and how moths fit into the world and your backyard. We will also look at some tips on how to look for moths and how to identify them.

David Bree grew up in Almonte, Ontario and developed an interest in the natural world at an early age. He has worked as a seasonal naturalist in the Provincial Park system. Since 2006 he has been the Park Naturalist at Presqu'île Provincial Park. After 33 years he will be retiring from Ontario Parks this spring (in time to go bird watching). For the last 32 years he has been a resident of Prince Edward County, though seasonal work has allowed time for international travel. He and his wife have managed to enjoy the natural world in six continents over the last couple of decades.

While all aspects of nature are of interest to David his early interests focused on the study of birds, vascular plants, and geology. An interest in insects grew during his time working in parks and he has pursued these throughout east-central Ontario. Dragonflies in particular have been a favourite study area, along with butterflies and moths.

FIELD TRIPS

Sunday 14 March 1 to 3 pm Car-Birding Portsmouth Harbour to Lemoine Point

The distance may hardly be 12 km, but this stretch of waterfront boasts many excellent vantage points over a diversity of habitats. New to Kingston and new to birding, Jenny shares her favourite local route. Join her on a tour of where to go, where to park, and what to look for throughout the seasons. This month, keep an eye out for resident red-tailed hawks and bald eagles, lingering winter waterfowl, and possible early arrivals such as blackbirds, killdeer, and song sparrows. The emphasis of this trip will be on birding locations – an ideal orientation for new birders and out-of-town KFN members. Members with mobility issues are especially encouraged to participate on this outing, as our tour and birding will take place entirely from our vehicles. Sunday 2 May Prince Edward Point Birding

Join fellow KFN members to explore the Prince Edward Point National Wildlife Area, a noted hotspot for spring bird migration.

The trip involves short walks of 1-1.5km on footpaths and an unpaved road. The terrain is mostly flat. No services other than washrooms are available at the point, so it would be advisable to bring drinks and lunch. Because parking space is limited and to ensure that physical distance can be maintained, this trip will be limited to six vehicles and 16 people (plus the leader and co-leader). At the April AGM, KFN members will vote in the election of the club's executive. The nominating committee is looking for volunteers willing to stand for election. We are looking to fill the following positions:

- * **Recording Secretary:** The Recording Secretary is an officer of the club, whose key responsibilities are taking the minutes at General and Executive meetings. The new Recording Secretary will take over the responsibility right after the election.
- * **Treasurer:** The Treasurer is a Director and senior member of the executive, and essentially is the Club's financial manager and bookkeeper. The plan is to elect a new Member-at-Large, who would work with Larry McCurdy for the next year and then take over after the 2022 AGM. KFN Nature reserves

Now that winter is almost over, we renew our invitation to visit our Nature Reserves. The Helen Quilliam Sanctuary is located north of Kingston, in the Shield, and offers several well-marked trails. It is an excellent location to find early butterflies at the end of April and the first blooming wildflowers at the same time. The Martin Edwards Reserve at the east end of Amherst Island is also available for walks along the shore of Lake Ontario at any time of the year. You can find a late Snowy Owl or emerging Garter Snakes in April.

Our most recently acquired property is the Sylvester-Gallagher Nature Reserve. It is on Amherst Island across the road from the Martin Edwards Reserve. This property was recently donated to the KFN and we are still improving the fencing, developing a Managed Forest Program and preparing a Management Plan. While it is not yet available for individual visits, we will organize some field trips to that location and we plan to open it to our members next year.

Nesting Season is Nearly Here

NestWatch is a nest monitoring program organized by the Cornell Laboratory of Ornithology. You do not have to participate in the program or download any app to make use of the treasure trove of information and tools Cornell has developed! Go to the Nestwatch home page at nestwatch.org where you can select "all about birdhouses" to find construction plans for every type of cavity nester. The "nest and egg ID" tab guides you through selection of nest type, habitat, and substrate and shows photos of nests and eggs to identify what species made any nest you find. It also tells you where and when to look for the nest of each species. Check it out at NESTWATCH.ORG.
