Louise de Kiriline Lawrence:

The Making of a Mid-Century Amateur Ornithologist

In 1935, Louise de Kiriline Lawrence, born into Swedish aristocracy and survivor of the Russian Civil War, retreated to her wilderness cabin on the Mattawa River. There, she discovered birds. Training herself in the art of observation and ornithology, she published ground-breaking studies and wrote six books and scores of magazine stories.

Ms Simonds writes on her website: "I knew Louise during my wilderness years, so it's a memoir, too, one that lays bare the process of piecing together another person's life."



An **alvar** is an environment on limestone with thin soils and exposed bedrock. Often flooded in the spring, and affected by drought in midsummer, alvars support distinctive flora and fauna. The Camden East Alvar is protected by Nature Conservancy of Canada.

Friday 20 May 12:15 pm to 5 pm Amherst Island IBA

Leader Kurt Hennige (khennige at xplornet.com) We will meet at 12:15 pm at the Amherst Island ferry dock in Millhaven to take the ferry to Amherst Island. The visit will include a long walk on rough terrain along the shoreline at the Martin Edwards Reserve. We will return from the island on the 5 pm ferry. Maximum 8 participants plus leader.

Saturday 21 May 6:30 am to 12:00 pm Moscow Marsh and Camden Lake IBA

Leader Anthony Kaduck (kaduckintransit at gmail.com) We will visit the Camden Lake IBA and Moscow Marsh. These sites north of Napanee are regular breeding grounds for a wide number of interesting species including uncommon birds like the Least Bittern, Black Tern, Bobolink and Common Gallinule. The trip will involve a short walk around the marsh, observation of Camden Lake from three viewpoints, and a walk through a mature woodland. In addition to viewing the birds, participants will be able to assist in developing data for the new Ontario Breeding Birds Atlas by recording breeding evidence. Friday 20 May noon to Sunday 22 May noon Spring Round-Up

Our 65th Spring Round-Up will be Friday noon to Sunday noon (20 to 22 May). Birds will be counted only within the KFN Bird Area which is a radial distance of 50 km centred on MacDonald Park, Kingston. See the KFN website for more details.

Count as many species and individuals as possible during this most exciting period of the birding year. Choose your favorite birding site within the KFN Bird Area, be it your own backyard, a local park, or migration hotspots like Prince Edward Point, Amherst Island or Wolfe Island.

Bird alone or with a group of birding buddies for as long or short period of time as you like. Bird casually, or bird intensely, or just photograph the birds you enjoy.

All are encouraged to send their sightings as soon as possible to eBird or by email to Mark Read (markdread at gmail.com) to create a master list for the event, crunching the data to produce some statistics to share with everyone in the next Bluebill.

Saturday 18 June 8:00 am to 3:00 pm (rain date 19 June) Solitude in the Sanctuary

Meet at the Helen Quilliam Sanctuary where the culvert crosses Bedford Road. We will start at the headwaters of Rothwell Lake and make our way into Holleford Lake. Using the iNaturalist app, we will generate benchmark data about the rich natural diversity of Belle Park. Until the early 1950s Belle Park was part of the Great Cataraqui Marsh.


From 1954-1974 it was a municipal landfill. In the mid-1970s, the city built a golf course on the buried waste. After major flooding in 2017, the golf course closed. Since that time, 'nature' has been reclaiming the site. An annual bioblitz will help us get a better sense of how the park's ecosystem is changing.

This event is open to everyone. No experience is necessary. Help will be available (see schedule) for anyone unfamiliar with iNaturalist or with the park. Conservation Committee Report

SOUTH SHORE MARINE CONSERVATION AREA



The Kingston Field Naturalists are supporting Nature Canada’s campaign to establish a Parks Canada National Marine Conservation Area in the Eastern part of Lake Ontario.

An NMCA would prohibit oil, gas, mineral and aggregate exploration on the lake bed, and put strict limits on the disposal of items from shipping (dumping). Activities that are ecologically sustainable would still be allowed, including hunting, fishing, shipping, recreational activities and tourism.

We are excited by the project which would protect our local environment and contribute to the Federal Government’s target of protecting 25% of Canadian land and freshwater by 2025.

DAVIS TANNERY SITE

The request for Official Plan and Zoning Bylaw Amendments to allow Patry Developments to work on the Davis Tannery site is going to Planning Committee on May 19th. It is not clear whether this will be the same request and proposal that was made last August, or whether it has been modified in response to concerns expressed at the public meetings.

PROPOSED CONDO TOWERS AT 1102 KING ST

The proposal to build two side by side condo towers in Commodore's Cove - one of 24 stories and the other 25 stories – goes before Planning Committee on 16 June. The towers would be predominantly glass, and given their location on the waterfront, there is concern about the potential for a high number of birds colliding with the windows. It is hoped that the developer will take mitigation measures like “bird friendly” glass. City staff will encourage them to do so, however, the City does not have the power under the Planning Act to regulate to that level of detail regarding windows.
