

Thursday 18 April will be our Annual General Meeting

We will have a short report of our activities in the past year, a review of the budget, and a vote by the membership on a slate of candidates for the 2024/2025 Executive. When the work is done, we will have a presentation by **Barry Gilbert entitled** *Return of the Grizzly*.

Barrie Gilbert completed undergraduate studies at Queen's University and a PhD at Duke University. He then joined the faculty of Utah State University and carried out research on grizzly bears. In 1977, while conducting research in Yellowstone National Park, he was attacked and badly mauled by a female Grizzly protecting her cubs. After recovering he returned and devoted the next several decades to understanding and protecting these bears. He has researched Grizzlies in Yosemite and Yellowstone national parks, Alberta, coastal British Columbia and along Brooks River in Alaska's Katmai National Park. His research has centered on how bears respond to people and each other, with a focus on how to keep humans and bears safe. Barrie Gilbert is the author of *One of Us*. He will be available for a book signing after the presentation.

Jonathan Balcombe was born in England, raised in New Zealand and Canada, and has lived in the United States. He has an undergraduate degree in biology from York University, a Master's degree from Carleton University and a Ph.D in ethology (animal behavior) from the University of Tennessee. He was formerly the Department Chair for Animal Studies with the Humane Society University, and director of Animal Sentience with the Humane Society Institute for Science and Policy. Jonathan Balcombe is the author of four popular science books on the inner lives of animals. His book, *What a Fish Knows*, is a New York Times best-seller. His books will be available for sale and signing after his presentation.

75th ANNIVERSARY CHALLENGE

The KFN is encouraging every member to help celebrate our 75th Anniversary by making a list of 75 nature-orientated activities/observations that they have carried out over the spring and summer. Lists can be produced on any topic chosen by the member. For example:

- 75 species of bird (or other living things) observed
- 75 plants recorded in a city park, conservation area or nature reserve
- · 75 insects observed and identified by their proper Latin name

Members with reduced mobility could participate by producing lists such as:

- 75 birds or other types of wildlife seen on television
- 75 articles read from a pile of magazines waiting to be read

Or somebody could list activities such as:

- 75 acts of kindness to nature
- · 75 times the member went out at night to look at the stars
- · 75 native seeds or plants planted

Members are also invited to write a short description of how they created their list. These descriptions together with the associated lists will be published as an article in The Blue Bill.

KFN Contributes to City of Kingston's Decision to Sign the Montreal Pledge

At the COP15 conference in Montreal in December 2022, 190 countries, including Canada, signed on to an agreement to work together to halt and reverse the decline in biodiversity. To address this issue at a local level, the City of Montreal invited all cities around the world to declare their intention to contribute to this global initiative. The pledge sets out 15 tangible actions to which a city must commit in their efforts to preserve natural ecosystems. These actions include a) conserving and restoring natural areas, b) effectively engaging Indigenous Peoples and communities in decision-making and knowledge sharing, c) embedding biodiversity into governing policies and frameworks, d) reducing waste, pollution and pesticides.

The KFN, along with Little Forests Kingston and other local conservation groups, have been working with Kingston City staff to encourage the City Council to sign this pledge. These efforts have paid off. At the City Council meeting on 19 March, a report produced by Paige Agnew (Commissioner, Growth & Development Services) and Julie Salter-Keane (Manager, Climate Leadership) recommended that the city sign the Montreal Pledge and also that the city track their progress on the CitiesWithNature registry. This current City Council appears to be listening to concerns regarding climate change and loss of species diversity. By signing this pledge, City Council states that they recognize the need to move towards improving local policies that support environmentally sustainable practices. Tracking progress on the Cities With Nature Action Platform lets the city showcase actions and share information with other cities. It is incumbent on city residents to monitor progress and to be vocal when the City does not act in the best interest of nature.

REVIEW OF AVIAN INFLUENZA IN THE KINGSTON REGION (Report by Chris Hargreaves, Conservation Committee Chair)

The outbreak of Highly Pathogenic Avian Influenza (HPAI) in the Kingston region appears to be over for this season. It began about 31 January, when numerous dead Canada Geese were reported at Lake Ontario Park and the Elevator Bay area. The Sandy Pines Wildlife Centre also received calls and distressed birds from Collins Bay, Bath, and Belleville. About 100 dead geese were recorded. There were several reports of gulls, crows and eagles feeding on carcasses; it is very likely that these birds would become infected with HPAI.

To establish what was happening throughout the Kingston region, the Kingston Field Naturalists organized a "citizen science" survey. Members were asked to send in observations from sites they visited, reporting if they had seen dead geese or other birds, and whether birds displayed normal activity.

By the beginning of March about twenty dead crows had been reported. Some of these carcasses were tested by the Canadian Wildlife Health Co-operative and found to be infected with HPAI. In March the geese started moving north, and the crows dispersed from their roost in downtown Kingston. As the birds moved away, the risk of infection between them reduced. At the beginning of April, the Sandy Pines Wildlife Centre had received no birds in distress for a week, and reports of dead birds had stopped coming in to the KFN survey.

Odes and Leps Field Trip #1: Climb the highest point in Leeds & Grenville and look for butterflies, dragonflies and other flying insects with fellow enthusiasts. This is a long and arduous 10 km hike with steep hills. Come prepared with plenty of water and snacks. You will also want sun and bug protection. Saturday 18 May 8:00 am to 11:00 am Finkle's Shore Park and Lennox OPG

Leader Kurt Hennige The meeting place for this outing is at the main parking lot at Finkle's Shore Park (Bath). Carpooling from Finkle's Shore will be offered. Our group will travel to the Lennox OPG parking lot to observe a KFN bird box program. Participants may witness nesting Peregrine Falcons, Ospreys, Cliff Swallows and Purple Martins. As part of our 75th anniversary celebration, Kurt Hennige will lead a Dawn Chorus field trip. Dawn Song Patrols were popular in the 1970's to 1990's; they included an outdoor breakfast. We will assemble at 3:30 am at the Carpool lot at Hwy401/Hwy15. We will be start by birding Abbey Dawn Marsh and Road and later will bird Canoe Lake Road. At a few stops along Canoe Lake Road the leader will demonstrate how to follow a "Breeding Bird Survey" protocol. We will stop about 8:30 am in either Verona or Sydenham for breakfast in a restaurant and return to our cars around 10:30 am.

This outing requires participants willing to drive and share cars, since for safety reasons we will have only four cars and a maximum of 15 people and one leader.
